Note: Chapter 22 is a prophecy in two parts. The first part, Isaiah 22:1-19, predicts Jerusalem's future destruction, then Isaiah 22:20-25, predicts Jerusalem's future restoration. Chapter 24 contains two short oracles. An oracle is a message given to a prophet to give publicly. These two chapters employ images and themes that reappear in later Jewish and Christian writings.

## Isaiah 22

- 1. In Isaiah's description of Jerusalem being invaded, none of the Jewish people appear to be heroic or trying to defend Jerusalem.
  - a. How are the ordinary citizens behaving? (Is 22:1-2)
  - b. How are the leaders behaving? (Is 22:3)
- 2. The Lord watches "a day of tumult and trampling and terror" in Jerusalem. (Is 22:5)
  - a. What are the invaders doing to the walls and buildings of Jerusalem? (Is 22:5, 9-10)
  - b. What kinds of sounds are heard in the city? (Is 22:5)
  - c. Where in the city are the invaders' horsemen and charioteers to be found? (Is 22:6-7)
- 3. Isaiah alludes to a time, shortly before Jerusalem's future destruction, when God will give the people a chance to repent.
  - a. What did the Lord ask the people to do as a sign of repentance? (Is 22:12)
  - b. How did the people respond? (Is 22:13)
  - c. What is the cynical saying about life and death that is still often quoted today? (Is 22:13)
- 4. The Lord places the key to the house of David on the king's shoulder. (Is 22:22)
  - a. What do you think the key symbolizes? (Is 22:20-22)
  - b. Can you see a connection between the "key carried on the shoulder," and the current expression "carrying the weight of the world on his shoulder"?
- 5. In the New Testament, Jesus is the messianic King from David's line. To whom does Jesus give the "key" and why? (Matt 16:18-19)

## Isaiah 24 Note: In this chapter, Isaiah is poetically describing the final days of Jerusalem's destruction preceding their journey into captivity in Babylon.

- 6. "The Lord lay waste the earth and make it desolate." (Is 24:1)
  - a. Why would the Lord lay waste the land? (Is 24:3)
  - b. Who does Isaiah say is responsible for the devastation? (Is 24:19-22)
- 7. *Reflection*: Can you see parallels in this chapter with current day warnings of the earth heating up, ocean levels rising, and overuse of fossil fuels and rare metals?
