Note: Beginning with a short poem (Is 50:1-3), the Lord uses rhetorical questions to rebut Israel's claim that it was the Lord that sent them into captivity. The remaining verses (Is 50:4-11) are the Third Servant Song in which the Servant sings about what the Lord has done for him, and then he sings to the people, exhorting them to follow him.

- 1. In this short poem, (Is 50:1-3), Isaiah uses two metaphors to convey the Lord's reply to Israel's accusation that God had abandoned them to captivity in Babylon.
 - a. Explain how the metaphor of divorce shows abandonment. (Is 50:1)
 - b. Explain how the metaphor of selling off goods (e.g., during a bankruptcy) shows abandonment. (Is 50:1)
 - c. How does the Lord refute the people's accusations of abandonment by God? (Is 50:2)

Third Servant Song (Is 50:4-11)

- 2. How do we know that the Lord is preparing the Servant to speak publicly to the people? (Is 50:4)
- 3. Who will be the Servant's main audience? (Is 50:4)
- 4. What suggests that the Servant's assignment will be a difficult mission? (Is 50:5)
- 5. What is the response the Servant receives from his listeners when he preaches the message the Lord has given him? (Is 50:6)
- 6. The Servant is mishandled and humiliated by his accusers. (Is 50:5-6)a. What gives the Servant the strength to continue to tolerate such behavior? (Is 50:7)
 - b. What is the Servant's nonviolent response to his accusers? (Is 50:8-9)
- 7. How do we know that the Servant hopes to attract followers who will also preach the Lord's words of protection to weary and oppressed people? (Is 50:4)
- 8. The Servant says there are typically two ways that people deal with darkness.
 - a. Name the two ways people deal with darkness. (Is 50:10-11)
 - b. What happens to those who rely on themselves to get through darkness? (Is 50:11)
- 9. *Challenge*: In many ways, the Third Servant Song reflects the life of Jesus. Can you find passages in the New Testament that answer the following questions?
 - a. Did Jesus have the same teacher as the Servant? (Is 50:4-5; John 1:1-3; John 8:28)
 - b. Was Jesus sent by God for a public ministry? (Is 50:4-5; John 20:21; Matt 28:19)
 - c. To whom was Jesus first sent to preach? (Is 50:5; Luke 2:22-32, 41-50)
 - d. Did Jesus receive maltreatment and humiliation from religious leaders? (Is 50:7-9; John 10:30-33)
 - e. Was Jesus' response to maltreatment a non-violent one? (Is 50:5-6; Matt 5:38-40; Matt 26:51-54)
 - f. Did God vindicate Jesus in the end? (Is 50:8-9; John 3:16-17; 1 Tim 3:16; Heb 2:9)
