

The Installation of Rev. Robert

(Fr. Bob) Romaine at Sacred Heart Catholic Church Dade City

On Sunday, September 21, 2025, an atmosphere of reverence, gratitude, and hope filled



Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Dade City, Florida. Parishioners gathered, friends reunited, and clergy from the Diocese of St. Petersburg assembled to witness a momentous occasion: the installation of Rev. Robert (Fr. Bob) Romaine as the official pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, presided over by Bishop Gregory Parkes. After serving a year as Parochial Administrator, Fr. Bob transitioned into this new role with the blessings of both his congregation and the bishop, marking a new chapter in the spiritual journey of the parish.

Fr. Bob's journey to Sacred Heart Catholic Church is marked by years of unwavering dedication to ministry and pastoral care. Before he arrived in Dade City, he served as parochial vicar at Holy Family Catholic Church in St. Petersburg, and before that, served at St. Paul's Catholic Church in Tampa. During this time at St. Paul's, he founded the St. Francis Ministry and became the first chaplain of the ministry. In this

capacity, he demonstrated a rare combination of compassion, innovation, and spiritual leadership that has left a lasting impact on the communities he served.

His appointment as Parochial Administrator at Sacred Heart one year ago was met with anticipation and optimism. During this period, Fr. Bob became a familiar and beloved presence among parishioners. He led Mass with warmth and sincerity, guided faith formation programs, and championed outreach efforts to the wider Dade City community. We are blessed to call him Pastor! Congratulations, Fr. Bob!

Pilgrimage to Espiritu Santu

The Jubilee Year has provided us with opportunities to experience other parishes and to receive special indulgences. The pilgrimage to Espiritu Santu was a meaningful experience, combining spiritual reflection, tradition, and a sense of togetherness. We explored the campus, with its beautiful landscape, and participated in Mass led by Fr. Len, former pastor of St. Paul's.



Espiritu Santu, named for the "Holy Spirit," is rich in history and was founded as a place for worship, education, and growth. It began with the arrival of the Spanish and the Catholic Faith to Florida's West coast in 1539 by Hernando Desoto. In the search for wealth and the mythical "Fountain of Youth", Desoto landed on the shores of what is now known as Tampa Bay on Pentecost Sunday, where he discovered five mineral springs near a large Tocobaga Indian Village. He named the body of water Bahia Espiritu Santo (Bay of the Holy Spirit) in honor of the holy day and because the inhabitants of the nearby Indian village believed the springs had healing properties, a legend that persists today. Through the years, it has expanded and

adapted, shaped by devoted individuals and the changing needs of its community.

Our Lady of Good Health Novena August 30 – September 7, 2025

During the annual Novena to Our Lady of Good Health, the St. Francis Ministry participated on the sixth day of the novena by guiding the congregation in praying the Holy Rosary. This day stands out as a powerful reminder of the strength of community and shared faith within the tradition of Marian devotion.



The nine-day novena is a cherished Catholic tradition, particularly among communities associated with Our Lady of Vailankanni. Each day focuses on different themes and intentions, and the sixth day becomes especially meaningful as the St. Francis Ministry leads the faithful in meditation on the mysteries of the Rosary, encouraging everyone to unite their prayers and intentions.

St. Francis and the Taming of the Wolf

The story of how St. Francis of Assisi tamed the Wolf of Gubbio is one of the great legends linked with the life of the saint. I have never been too worried as to whether the story was historically true or not. I am more interested in seeing how the story fits into the pattern of biblical themes and of God's plans for creation. In this well-known legend, St. Francis goes to the Italian town of Gubbio, where a fierce wolf had been terrorizing the village and even killing some of the people, including children.

During his visit to Gubbio, Francis goes out to meet the wolf. You can find an account of this event in *The Little Flowers of Saint Francis*, a 14th-century collection of stories about Francis and his companions. According to the story, when the wolf sees St. Francis, he comes charging at the saint with his mouth open, ready to attack.



St. Francis immediately makes the sign of the cross over him and says, "Come here, Brother Wolf. I command you on behalf of Christ that you do no harm to me or to anyone." As soon as St. Francis did this, notes *The Little Flowers*, "the fearsome wolf

closed his mouth and stopped running; and once the command was given, it came meekly as a lamb, and threw itself at the feet of St. Francis."

Then St. Francis scolds Brother Wolf for destroying and killing the creatures of God. "The whole town is complaining about you," Francis tells the wolf gently. "But I want to make peace between you and the people. And so I promise that I will have food given to you regularly, Brother Wolf, by the people of this town so that you will no longer suffer hunger. And I want you, Brother Wolf, to promise that you will never harm any human person or animal." The wolf showed agreement by simply bowing his head.

And so Francis asks the people of the town if they will promise to provide food for wolf regularly. They all say they will. Finally, St. Francis asks the wolf to give a guarantee in front of all of the people that he will no longer inflict harm upon the people of Gubbio or its animals.

"Then the wolf, lifting his right paw, placed it in the hand of St. Francis. Because of this action...there was such rejoicing and wonder among all the people...that they all began to cry to heaven, praising and blessing God who sent Francis to them who, through his merits, had freed them from the jaws of the cruel beast."

"Afterwards, that same wolf lived in Gubbio for two years, and he tamely entered the houses, going from door to door, without doing any harm to anyone and without any being done to him; and he was kindly fed by the people....Finally after two years Brother Wolf died of old age, at which the citizens grieved very much."

The "peaceable kingdom" is an expression of the messianic era of peace, foreseen by the prophet Isaiah in this famous passage: "Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them" (11:6).

In part, what the story of Francis and the wolf reveals to us is that St. Francis—as a follower of Christ, the Messiah foretold by Isaiah—is helping to bring about the same peace and reconciliation in this world. This peace, harmony and reconciliation is not

only meant to exist between God and humans, but also between God and the whole family of creation! We, too, can be instruments of peace.
